# Historic Eastford farm preserved by ECHPC

EASTFORD — It's hard to top Paul Blair's 30-plus acre farm on Route 171 in Eastford as a picture-perfect postcard example of a New England farm. The property is one of the prettiest spots in Eastford. The farm was purchased by Paul's immigrant grandparents in 1908 and operated as a dairy farm for many years. Paul grew up there and has lived there most of his life and has a great affection for the property.

A couple of years ago, the Eastford Conservation and Historic Preservation Commission (ECHPC) mailed letters to many significant property holders in Eastford to ask if they had an interest in conserving their properties against future development by means of a conservation easement. A conservation easement is a restriction placed upon a property deed which restricts future development by any subsequent purchaser. The ECHPC offered to help any interested landowner search for funding and/or assist with a conservation effort in other ways.

Paul answered the ECHPC letter, and together with the ECHPC sought out funding for a conservation easement. Paul's property qualified for potential funding under the State of Connecticut's Department of Agriculture's Farmland Preservation Program. The ECHPC worked with Paul to submit an application and helped him through the lengthy evaluation process.

Fortunately, the property was selected by the state for farmland conservation, and

recently Paul was awarded some funding, in exchange for which he placed qualifications on the property deed restricting the larger share of the property to farming only activity in perpetuity. Thus, the pretty farm property we all drive by on Route 171 will remain picture postcard perfect into the long-term future and will continue to mark Eastford as a quintessential New England town.

# Bulldogs tough 2025 soccer season comes to an end

EASTFORD — It was a difficult season for the Eastford Bulldogs soccer squad, as their 2025 soccer season concluded on Thursday, Oct. 16, without a victory.

This year's season consisted of 10 games (five at home, and five away — see schedule below) played on Tuesdays and Thursdays, against Ashford Middle School, Wheeler Middle School (North Stonington), St. James Middle School (Killingly), Parish Hill Middle School (Chaplin), and Pomfret Community School.

The Bulldogs were outscored 73-13 during the season. Sylas Platt finished the year as the Bulldogs' leading scorer with four goals, Kameron Pacheco and Charlie Ellsworth each had three, Callum St. John had two, and Blake Gilbert had one to round out the scoring.

Head Coach Kullen Pacheco spoke to the *Communicator* about the season, expressing his pride for the effort his team displayed this year.

"I'm proud of the effort and commitment the players showed each week," Pacheco said. "They grew as athletes and as teammates, and I hope they carry those lessons forward both on and off the field."

In practice, the sentencing for the male minor means that despite the 20-year sentence, the person will only serve three years in actual custody, and the remaining 17 years suspended. That means those years will not be served unless the person violates probation or commits another crime. After being released from those three years in custody, the person must complete five years of probation, under supervision and with conditions (such as regular check-ins, no new offenses, etc.). However, if they violate probation or reoffend, the court can re-impose some or all of that suspended time.



Did you know that the sinking of the RMS Lusitania, and two days later, the USS Housatonic, causing the tragic loss of many American lives, resulted in the United States entering World War I?

Provoked by Germany's unrestricted U Boat warfare on seagoing vessels, President Wilson joined forces with the United Kingdom, and on April 6, 1917, after remaining neutral for three years, the United States officially entered the 'Great War."

On May18, 1917, President Wilson signed into law the Selective Service Act to fill the needs of the military to effectively engage the enemy. Eastford answered the call sending forth 19 men to serve our country. Most would see action overseas with only one man, Clarence Dews, returning home with injuries.

At 5:40 a.m. on Nov. 11, with flare pistols shooting red, green, blue, and white light into the sky and men cheering and yelling, the Armistice was signed. All troops were ordered to cease firing at 11 a.m.





# Police announce arrest of Eastford shooting suspect

upon meeting in Woodstock, the suspect entered his produced a handgun, and shot him before fleeing the scene with another male in a silver Volvo sedan. Due to the nature of this incident, the investigation was then assumed by Eastern District Major Crime Detectives.

Detectives secured the victim's vehicle and located a secondary crime scene on Mill Bridge Road in Woodstock, where evidence was including suspected collected,

marijuana, clothing, and a high-capacity, 9 mm magazine.

Through investigative leads. vehicle, detectives identified the suspect as evidence King Michael Adoty, 19, of Woodstock, who matched the description provided by the victim and was previously observed operating a silver 2015 Volvo S80. In the early morning hours of Sept. 28, Troopers located the suspect's vehicle at his Woodstock residence. voluntarily Adoty agreed to accompany detectives to a \$250,000 cash/surety bond. The Troop D, where he admitted his involvement in the shooting during still ongoing, police said.




