Planning Commission seeks participation in POCD survey

EASTFORD — The Town of Eastford Planning Commission has begun the process of updating the town's Plan of Conservation & Development (POCD). The POCD sets the vision for how the town would like to move forward over the next 10 years.

The Planning Commission is responsible for updating the POCD at a minimum once every 10 years, as required by state statutes. Eastford's POCD was last updated in 2016 and can be found on the town's website. This update provides an opportunity for the town to consider whether to make changes in terms of the goals and objectives for the community.

As part of the process, the commission will be conducting a Community Survey that will be available both online and in print at various locations throughout town starting Jan. 1, 2026. Scan the survey's QR code that

Bulldogs boys remain competitive going into holiday break

Editor's Note: Live coverage of the Eastford Bulldogs basketball season is posted after every game on the Eastford Communicator's Facebook page. The following article is a brief summary of our coverage up to the halfway point of the season. Follow us on Facebook for more photos and information as it becomes available!

EASTFORD — It's been an up-and-down season for the Eastford Bulldogs boys' team, but at the halfway point, they find themselves in the hunt, with a record of 2-2.

Starting out with a loss to St. James at home on Dec. 4, Eastford pulled off two consecutive victories against Parish Hill (Dec. 8) and Wheeler (Dec. 11), followed by a loss to Pomfret on Dec. 16. Originally scheduled for Thursday, Dec. 18, Eastford's game against Ashford was postponed, with a make-up date yet to be determined. The postponement means that the Bulldogs head into the holiday break with a .500 record. The victory against Parish Hill last month was the first for the program in nearly three years, and Head Coach Zach Hutchings, who is in his fourth year with the program, was excited to see if it would continue to trend upward for the Bulldogs.

"I couldn't be [prouder] of the boys," Hutchings said after the game on Dec. 8. "They showed hustle and grit that I hope to continue to see throughout this season. I can't wait to go get some more."

It only took them three days to get their second win, as they handled Wheeler at home on Dec. 11.

"The boys played with the same tenacity that got us a win the other night," Hutchings said after the team's win over Wheeler. "Everyone contributed. As a coach, you can't ask for much more."

Callum St. John has emerged as the offensive leader for the Bulldogs, scoring 50 points through four games, an average of 12.5 points per game. Charlie Ellsworth (6.8 ppg), Sylas Platt

(6.3 ppg), Jackson Ritter (4.8 ppg), Blake Gilbert (3.8 ppg), and Ryan Collard (2.3 ppg) have also contributed points for the team.

After the holiday break, the Bulldogs boys' team will kick off the road portion of their schedule with a visit to North Stonington, and a rematch with Wheeler on Tuesday, Jan. 6. Tipoff (Varsity only) is slated for 3:30 p.m.

BULLDOGS GIRLS' TEAM SEARCHING FOR ELUSIVE FIRST WIN

Shifting gears to the Bulldogs girls' team, the first all-girls team in several years has been fighting for that first win, but it has not come yet — as the team stands 0-5 at the halfway point of the season with losses to St. James (Dec. 4), Parish Hill (Dec. 8), Wheeler (Dec. 11), Pomfret (Dec. 16), and Ashford (Dec. 18).

Mackenzie Lathrop is the team's leading scorer, with 21 points through five games (4.2 ppg). Olivia DePercio (1.8 ppg), Zoë Labonte (1.2 ppg), Emma-Lynn Salony (0.6 ppg), Georgia Barlow (0.4 ppg), and Aiyana Reed (0.2 ppg) have also contributed offensively.

After the holidays, the Bulldogs girls' team will kick off the home portion of their schedule by hosting Wheeler on Tuesday, Jan. 6. Junior Varsity will tip off at 3:30 p.m., and Varsity tipoff is slated for 4:15 p.m.

Tree of Life ceremony pays tribute to lost friends and family

EASTFORD — On Sunday, Dec. 7, people from all over northeastern Connecticut gathered together in 11 different locations to remember lost family and friends for Day Kimball Healthcare's 36th Annual Hospice Tree of Life Ceremony.

In Eastford, a gathering was held at the Ivy Glenn Memorial. The other towns hosting events were Brooklyn, Canterbury, Danielson, Griswold, Plainfield, Pomfret, Putnam, Sterling, Thompson, Woodstock. In years past, the tree lighting event has raised about \$35,000 annually to support hospice and palliative care services in the region. Trees at all 11 locations were decorated with colored lights, which

according to DKH, symbolize "love and hope," helping family and friends to remember loved ones who have passed away while in hospice care. Each year, Day Kimball Healthcare offers the purchase of memorial lights on each community's Tree of Life to benefit the work done by Hospice & Palliative Care of Northeastern Connecticut to enhance the lives of terminally ill patients and their families.

Eastford's Tree Lighting Ceremony, which was hosted by the Congregational Church of Eastford (CCE), began with a selection of Christmas carols. Day Kimball Healthcare Foundation Director of Development Kristen E. Willis delivered remarks, thanking people for their support. CCE Pastor Mike Moran delivered the

invocation.

Hospice representatives Susan Honeychurch and Ashley Ravenelle also addressed the crowd, thanking them for supporting hospice and palliative care in the region. The tree lighting itself was conducted by Justin Loss, in honor of his grandmother, Helene, who died in December 2024.

"Thank you all again for being here tonight to support these efforts and more importantly to take time to reflect on the journey of Hospice and the significance of what has become a community celebration of hope and healing," Willis said, adding a message from 2025 Tree of Life Chairman Roger Franklin: "As we gather here, and at the other 10 sites throughout northeastern Connecticut this evening, we can

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT: DONNA LEAKE

The winter weather season has arrived. With it comes one of the most exciting messages a student can receive — no school today due to snow or ice-covered roads.

In Eastford, for closings or delays, due to busing schedules, we generally follow the decision of Woodstock Academy. Making a weather-related call is never easy. When the decision is straight forward, I like to make the announcement the evening before so families can make plans for the adjusted schedule. If the decision is not clear, the call may be delayed until the morning.

Occasionally, a snow call may be changed from a delay to a closing. Changing from a delay to a closing may occur due to changes in the pattern of the storm, roads that cannot be cleared as quickly as anticipated, or buses that fail to start. The safety of our students is the most critical factor in making final decisions. All EES staff and

families receive text, voice and e-mail messages concerning school closing and other important information.

The weather does not impact the volunteer spirit that permeates the Eastford community. At EES, we are fortunate to receive volunteer support from many members of the community. Over the next few months, I hope to highlight individuals and groups that share their time and talents to enrich the lives of the students at EES.

Since 2013, volunteers from the Congregational Church of Eastford have been providing a variety of after-hours experiences for our students, that include constructing bird houses, playing board games, building rockets, making crafts, supporting the homework club and one-one mentoring. Over the years, the time has varied from one to four afternoons a week, and the number of volunteers has varied from 20-50 individuals per year.

These activities benefit not only our students but also the seniors, as evidenced by statements such as, "I somehow thought I didn't like kids until I started sitting cross-legged on the floor in the school library playing 'Chutes and Ladders' with littles. Who couldn't fall in love with them?" Or, "When I was in junior high, I was all into model rockets. At EES it is such a blessing to have been able to share that excitement with such fine middle school students."

In other news:

- The application process for the Ethel Cushing Gardner Scholarship is now open. This is a scholarship open to high school seniors and college level students who live in Eastford and have a serious interest in music. Additional information is available on the Eastford School website.

- The Board of Education met on Dec. 11 and took the following

actions: We welcomed Nancy Neff to her first term; approved the re-appointment of Stephen Bowen as BOE chairman, Terry Cote as vice chairman and Adam Minor as secretary; and approved revisions to several policies.

Each new year brings to any community a new set of challenges, accomplishments, and surprises. I am confident that in 2026 the Eastford learning community will work together to overcome challenges, celebrate accomplishments, and hope that all surprises are positive. One of the first challenges the BOE faces is the development of the 2026-27 budget. At the Jan. 8 Board of Education meeting, I will present a recommended budget to the BOE for review at its budget meetings on Jan. 22 and Feb. 3.

We recommend that the above information be created and filled out in its entirety, regularly

updated, multiple copies made and visibly taped to the refrigerator door. A copy will be given to the ambulance service, one to the receiving hospital emergency department and one to be updated. Having the above readily accessible will enhance our transfer of critical information.

The fire department responded to 31 "911" emergencies in November. For fun, we participated in the 26th Annual Dazzle Light Parade on Dec. 7, in Putnam, brightly lit with colorful lights on an engine tanker.

Welcome to Dan Driscoll as our newest member. Dan will be cross-trained as an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) and in Fire Suppression.

FROM THE GROVE CEMETERY ASSOCIATION BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Rules and regulations from the Grove Cemetery Association Board of Trustees:

- The planting of real or artificial trees and shrubs, whether in the ground or in containers, will not be allowed. Live flowers (annuals or bulbs) may be planted or placed in plastic pots at the base of the monument. These plants must not extend more than 12" from the base. On a single interment space (4' X 9') with a flush marker and in the Cremation Section of the cemetery, only cut flowers or live, potted plants will be allowed. Seasonal wreaths, logs, or baskets containing live or artificial flowers will be allowed from Thanksgiving to March 15.

- The Trustees will conduct a general clean-up of the cemetery grounds after March 15 each year. Flowers and seasonal wreaths and logs will be removed at this time.

- *Ornaments and Other Objects:* At any time throughout the year, ornaments and other objects such as, but not limited to, artificial flowers, shells, toys, balloons,

rocks, metal designs, statues, luminaries/solar lights, chairs, settees, and glass vases shall not be placed on burial plots/spaces. Such ornaments and other objects, if left, will be removed by the Board of Trustees (or designee).

- American flags and Eastford Volunteer Fire Department flags will be placed at the cemetery by the Board of Trustees (or designee) on Memorial Day weekend and will be removed after Veterans Day (Nov. 11) on a date selected by the Board of Trustees. The placement of any flag, including the American flag, is limited to those flags placed on the graves of military and fire department veterans by the Board of Trustees. Unauthorized flags will be removed.

The Eastford Grove Cemetery is closed for all burials from Dec. 15 to April 15.

At this point, I probably wouldn't recognize most of you, and you may not yet recognize me. The moment after a baby is born, when the first few cries of delivery start to quiet, newborns typically spend an hour or so in a stage doctors call "quiet alert." Though they can't see great, they are searching for a face, and when they find one, they fix their






